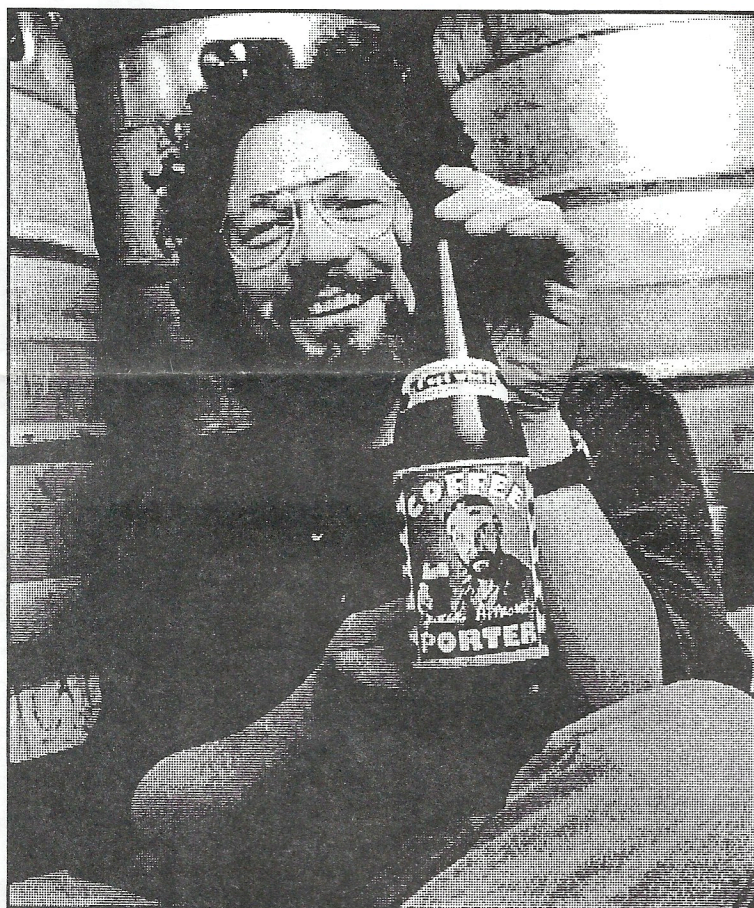

In April, the L.C.B.O. has promised that our Coffee Porter will be available in the Front St. liquor store in 625 mL bottles, complete with a label featuring someone who looks suspiciously like George. This is the first time in Ontario that a brewpub has been able to offer products that it makes for sale outside its walls. The Kingston brewpub licenced its Dragon's Breath recipe to Hart Brewing a couple of years ago, but to date no brewpub has produced its own brews directly for the

home consumer.

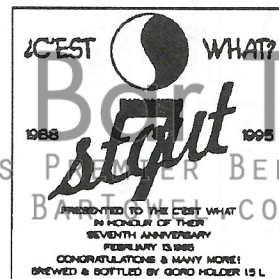
